

Max McCormick

Team Player & Firebirds Team Captain

he first puck is about to drop, the "Bird Barn" AKA Acrisure Arena is sold out, the crowd goes wild, and professional ice hockey makes its debut in the desert.

The date was October 16, 2022, with the Firebirds beating the Calgary Wranglers 6–5. "We had no idea what to expect says team captain Max McCormick. "Ice hockey in the desert, will anyone come to watch, will we sell any tickets," were all of the concerns McCormick and his teammates shared when coming to the desert to start training at the new facility.

McCormick's thoughts now, "It has been the most amazing experience for everyone on the team, the support we get from the fans is unbelievable, we love the Coachella Valley, we are proud to be on the Firebirds team and can't wait to bring home that championship trophy," shares McCormick.

As the Coachella Valley Firebirds' current and only captain with this newly formed team, McCormick's first spin on the ice came at the age of four when his parents took him to a nearby rink in the Green Bay area. "It wasn't until I was five when my parents put a stick in my hand, and then I was off to the races," recalls McCormick. Having an uncle that was a semi-professional hockey player for the Green Bay Bobcats, the sport was something the family grew into as a unit as McCormick was growing up, the more interest he had, the more ice hockey the family members began to play.

With a passion for the sport developing as he matured, McCormick excelled playing junior hockey for the Notre Dame Academy before moving to the Sioux City Musketeers of the United States Hockey League. Selected by the Ottawa Senators in the sixth round of the 2011 NHL Entry Draft, McCormick then committed to a collegiate career attending Ohio State University for three years. In 2014 McCormick turned professional with the Binghamton Senators of the American Hockey League, then in 2015 made his NHL debut on October 25, with Ottawa in a 4-1 defeat to the Arizona Coyotes.

McCormick's dream of a steady career in professional hockey became a reality due to McCormick's hard work ethic and dedication to the sport that eventually earned him the position of team captain for the Firebirds. With his wife Alexis, daughter Mia and Mikko, their pet golden doodle in tow, McCormick and his family now spend half the year in the Coachella Valley and half the year at their home in Green Bay. "We love it," says McCormick, "the more we get to know our way around the desert, the more it feels like home."

Practice is a daily routine for all of the players during the season, team meetings, gym, onto the ice and back to the gym. As team captain, for McCormick it's about a good work ethic, good team mates and a strong competitiveness. "A team has to hate to lose and love to win and do the right things on and off the ice to have it translate into success," explains McCormick. "It's about how we

prepare and practice and the strong team camaraderie that we have, it's a very special bond." And prepare the Firebirds have done and continue to do as this new team has won their division titles and has made their way to the Calder Cup finals in their first two seasons, quite an incredible feat.

However there must be a little time for fun, McCormick loves the outdoors, archery, bow hunting and golf! Playing to a 10, McCormick says he definitely has work to do. When in the Coachella Valley he's always trying new courses in the desert and enjoys the Classic Club and several others. Playing maybe three or four times a month during the season, once the off season arrives it's back to Green Bay where McCormick tries to play one or two times a week. When asked what his favorite club in his bag is, "My wedges."

On a lighter side, it's a known fact that fans are obsessed with hockey players teeth, a badge of honor of sorts on how many teeth have been knocked out during a career, with a laugh McCormick admits, "I had my teeth knocked out playing roller hockey when I was eight or nine years old, I had my two front teeth knocked out on the ice about two years ago, those are fake, the rest are mine."

Asked about the amount of gear worn during play? McCormick explains that the all of the gear is essential to safety. "With the speed and physicality of the sport we really need it all," McCormick replies after giving the question some thought. "As far as mile-per-hour, I'm not sure but I think we are up in about the 20 MPH range at any time, and then we are always making sudden stops."

With our interview time drawing to a close as McCormick needs to get back to the team practice, for him the sport is all about, "The comradery, the team bond, the laughs, the chirps, team dinners, and road trips, it's all really is a lot of fun."

And when asked to describe his life in one sentence, McCormick pauses for several seconds and says, "It's like a crazy hockey lifestyle with a strong family support system."



Pickleball in Paradise

Palm Desert now has a pickleball paradise for all skill levels

ast year, Miles Pelky, along with his wife, Uta Hamblen, decided to retire in the Palm Desert area, as they loved its lifestyle and weather. Although he thoroughly enjoyed both aspects of the desert from the moment they moved, he sought out another way to relish his retirement, aside from simply relaxing. He wanted to give back to the community, too.

With this in mind, he decided to reach out to a local pickleball facility to see if it needed any assistance. Not only did he soon become a coach at the facility, but he also began to offer various marketing services for it—two opportunities that led him to network extensively throughout the Palm Desert area.

While conducting marketing for the pickleball facility, he was surprised to learn the local Embassy Suites by Hilton had some old tennis courts. Upon reflecting on his conversation with a salesperson at the hotel and speaking with Uta, he realized he could give back to the Palm Desert community in an entirely different way: by opening his own pickleball facility.

After a few months of negotiations, Pelky's dream was realized, as his facility—known as Paradise Pickleball—was opened to the public on December 17, 2023. To provide unforgettable pickleball experiences for everyone in the Palm Desert area, he transformed the hotel's old tennis courts into 21 gorgeous, LED-lit, Professional Pickleball Association-approved pickleball courts, along with one tennis court.

As an example of Pelky's commitment to providing pickleball opportunities to everyone, whether they're seasoned veterans or they've never touched a pickleball paddle in their lives, some courts have been created for all levels of play. Each day, "open play" is available for everyone too, enabling novices to participate without being members. And, finally, to ensure advanced players are challenged, some courts are considered "challenge courts" as well.

"Our first season turned out better than we anticipated," Pelky said, while reflecting on the first few months of 2024. "We just opened up for our second season and have gained a lot of traction and anticipate our participation being doubled from the first season."

Pelky's positivity is related to four primary factors. First, Paradise Pickleball's location is ideal. After all, it is easy to find, as it's nestled right off of Highway 111 on the border of Indian Wells and Palm Desert. Not to mention, since it's near the mountains, it rarely has any high winds, an issue on most pickleball courts.

Furthermore, its partnership with Embassy Suites by Hilton (which it leased the pickleball courts area from) has led to a unique offering. Since the hotel is in front of the courts, guests can

conveniently stay at it and simply walk out the back door to the pickleball paradise that awaits them.

"If customers visit our website, paradisepickleball.net, go to the homepage and scroll down, they will see a link that gives them a special discount," Pelky stressed. "If they're playing in a tournament or are part of a large group, they may want to consider staying at the roughly 200-room hotel for three other reasons: free breakfast and two Happy Hour drinks."

Aside from its convenient location and partnership with Embassy Suites by Hilton, Paradise Pickleball also offers various membership choices. For example, customers can purchase a solo annual membership for \$399. If they'd like, they may buy a family (couples) annual membership for \$699 too; any additional family members, aside from the couple, need to pay \$100 each. Monthly memberships are available for \$99 as well.

Through a membership, customers' court rental fees and "open play" fees are waived, as they can reserve courts for free every day from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. In addition, they can reserve courts for up to two hours daily for free.

"If customers play a lot and spend a lot of time in the desert, they may want to pay for the annual membership," Pelky explained. "If they are just here for the weekend, then they can either pay to rent a court for their own group or join us for 'open play' sessions and pay a drop-in fee."

Drop-in rates for "open play" sessions are \$12 for four hours in the morning or \$10 for 2.5 hours in the evening. To rent a court with friends or family members, non-members need to pay \$40 an hour from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and \$24 per hour from 12 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Finally, Pelky believes one more aspect of Paradise Pickleball stands out: its staff members.

"As soon as guests arrive, they will feel welcomed and be paired with people that play at their level," he said. "Paradise Pickleball players are very nice and are there for the same purposes—to have fun, meet new people and exercise."

While reflecting on Paradise Pickleball's season-over-season growth, Pelky believes it will become "better and better as time goes on", as it will continue to be a fun, friendly place to play pickleball at.

"We have a lot on the horizon, including clinics, Round Robin events (that allow players to compete against various opponents), three-day camps and tournaments," he added. "I can't wait for what's to come!"

Eldorado Polo Club in Indio represents the pinnacle of polo tradition

ith over 250 polo clubs in the United States and Canada, California's polo fields showcase some of the sport's hotspots including Indio and Santa Barbara in the Golden State. Other prominent polo conclaves include Palm Beach in Florida, Westchester and the Hamptons in New York, and Greenwich in Connecticut.

Thrusting the west coast into the polo spotlight, players bring their ponies to El Dorado Polo Club in Indio, established in 1957 as one of the premier destinations for exceptional winter polo. The season kicks off December 29, 2024 with Sunday polo and continues through March 23, 2025.

HISTORY OF POLO

Polo originated in central Asia. It was first played in Persia (Iran) between the 6th century BC and the 1st century AD by the nomadic Iranian people. Women played as well as men. It was originally a training game for cavalry units, usually the king's guard or other elite troops. To the warlike tribesmen, who played with as many as 100 to a side, it was a miniature battle. The game was played from Constantinople, where Emperor Theodosius II constructed a polo ground early in the 5th century, to Japan by the Middle Ages. The game also spread south to Arabia and to India and Tibet.

The game guickly spread throughout Europe when the soldiers brought the game back to England, and it became more formal with leagues and teams.

British and Irish immigrants in the Argentine pampas started practicing polo. The sport spread quickly among the skillful gauchos in Argentina, now noted for having the largest contingent of 10 handicap players out of any other country.

The modern, international game of polo is derived from the form played in Manipur, India, where it was played even by commoners who owned a pony.

James Gordon Bennett Jr. organized what was recorded as the first polo match in the United States at Dickel's Riding Academy in New York City in May, 1876. Bennett established the Westchester Polo Club.

Polo has become a spectator sport for equestrians and high society, often supported by sponsorships. It is now prevalent around the world, with well over 100 member countries in the Federation of International Polo, played professionally in 16 countries. Polo was an Olympic sport from 1900 to 1936.

The Club-level Coachella, Stagecoach and Women's Leagues play throughout the season, and the Junior Polo Program and Tournaments take place Saturday and Sunday mornings. The Eldorado Polo and Riding Academy offers private and group lessons along with Academy matches.

Seasoned players favor El Dorado Polo Club for its 16 regulation premium grass polo fields, 1.5 mile manicured exercise track and on-site stabling capacity for over 800 horses. The Jackson Hole Horse Emporium Tack and Feed store is on site, and horse owners know that the Cantina Bar and Restaurant is open for breakfast and lunch through March.

Whether playing or spectating, the primer is simple. Polo is played by two opposing teams with the objective of scoring using a long-handled wooden mallet to hit a small hard ball through the opposing team's goal. Each team has four mounted riders, and the game usually lasts one to two hours, divided into sevenminute periods called chukkas or chukkers.

Sunday polo has become a command performance activity in the Coachella Valley during the winter months. Guests can attend matches at 12 p.m. and 2 p.m. every Sunday from December 29 to February 2, 2025 and at 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. from February 9 to March 23, 2025. Attire is smart casual, however spectators usually dress to impress.

Opportunities abound for maximizing the experience, starting with a Clubhouse table. Attendees can order from the full-service Clubhouse menu and bar while watching the fastpaced atches. Reservations are available (must be purchased in advance) for tables from four to ten people for either one or two matches, with parking.

Reserving a VIP emerald cabana is a luxurious option for a specific Sunday or the entire season for ten to 25 guests. This season, there will also be a new VIP polo lounge, designed exclusively for individuals. Watching chukkers becomes even more exciting while taking advantage of luxurious amenities field side.


Tailgating for the day is also part of the culture, with guests invited to bring their own food and drinks, such as the perennially crowd-pleasing Pimm's Cup, a classic British cocktail. Regularly consumed at polo matches, it's made with Pimm's No. 1 and ginger ale and infused with cucumber, strawberry and mint.

During the customary halftime break at polo matches, spectators are invited onto the lush green field at Eldorado to participate in the age-old ritual of divot stomping. Attendees spread out to replace the divots kicked up by the thundering hooves of the horses, creating lighthearted moments capturing photos and making new friends before the second half of the game begins.

Polo combines athleticism with the ultimate social gathering, a sophisticated "hockey on horseback." Whether one is a practiced spectator or brand new to the circuit, the display of speed, precision and teamwork between horse and rider is exhilarating. The picturesque Eldorado Polo Club delivers a long-standing tradition of excellence in this centuries-old sport.

Blake Wilcox

Sports Club Director Andalusia Country Club, La Quinta, California

Blake Wilcox has come a long way from growing up in Ogden, Utah, playing all sports, but excelling in tennis was where he made his mark. Wilcox started playing, excelling, and showing promise in national junior tournaments at the age of ten. In 1978, his high school tennis team won first place in a national tournament held at Duke University. In 1979 Wilcox teamed up with his mother to win several state and regional events, qualifying them for the U.S. Open in Flushing, New York. After high school, his path led him to Santa Barbara City College for two years, where he played on the tennis team.

In 1983 and 1984, Wilcox served as the tennis coach at Utah State University, and he decided that tennis was going to be his focus in life. He began competing in tournaments in the northwest and nationally and gained the attention of David Kramer, son of the great Jack Kramer, and was asked to become the tennis pro at Palm Valley Country Club in Palm Desert, CA, as well as The Lakes Country Club in Palm Desert, CA.

He loved the desert and served the both clubs for twenty-two years. Then in 2007 Andalusia Country Club was looking for a tennis professional, and Wilcox was their man, and this is where he has been the past seventeen years, enjoying every minute of his tenure. Wilcox says, "It has been more than just a pleasure working with the Sunrise company management team and with John Cummings, the longtime general manager serving both Rancho La Quinta Country Club and Andalusia Country Club.

With the rise in popularity of Pickleball, the nation's number one growing sport among men and women. Wilcox recognized the attraction of the sport and, twelve years ago, started with two pickleball courts at Andalusia Country Club, the first courts of its kind in the desert. He has seen first-hand the growth and excitement of the sport from its beginning and predicts a long life for the sport well into the future. The reasons he gives are that it is player-friendly, fun, fast-paced, more social, and a very welcoming game, as it lends itself well to the older player.

Wilcox does not like to brag, but he has a few pickleball trophies on his wall from winning the national championship in 2017 in Arizona and a second-place finish in 2018 played at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden. He has enjoyed himself here in the desert and says it was the best move he ever made. When asked, what is the best advice for pickleball players he says "stay out of the kitchen!" You pickleball players will know what that means.

Lindsey Winch

Head golf professional at Andalusia Country Club

rowing up in Edmonton, Canada, Lindsey Winch, head golf professional at Andalusia Country Club, never thought he would end up in sunny southern California. He was and still is an Edmonton Oiler hockey fan and traded the hockey stick in for a golf club early on. With the encouragement of his cousin David Woods, then the head golf professional at Indian Ridge Country Club, Winch came to the Coachella Valley in 2001 to attend College Of The Desert and play on the golf team. After college, he played some tournaments as a professional to see if the PGA tour was possible. He quickly learned how challenging it was to play and compete at that level. Wanting to stay in the Coachella Valley he was hired in professional positions at The Quarry Country Club in 2007 and later Rancho La Quinta Country Club. Winch joined Andalusia Country Club in 2009 as an assistant and was named head golf professional in 2011 by General Manager John Cummings, the longtime Drummond company and Sunrise corporation executive.


Winch says he loves the Coachella Valley and has no plans to leave. He has seen the growth of Andalusia over the last 15 years and feels the club will continue on its growth pattern into the future, and he hopes to be a part of its success. Winch's 15-year-old son Jackson, wanting to be a pilot, is not pushed by his father to get into the golf business. Golf is big in the Winch family, as older brother Marty, is

also a golf professional in Edmonton, Canada, and his father is a very fine player as well. Winch takes some pride in bringing long-time friend Kris Hartman in as his assistant and director of instruction. Hartman and Winch's friendship goes back to when they were both caddies at The Quarry in 2007. The two of them have developed a caddie program consisting of nine outside staff employees who assist members and outside groups when needed.

Winch's wife Mandy, also an excellent golfer, played golf at Pepperdine University and the University of Reno and is a fitness trainer at Andalusia and also The Tradition Golf Club in La Quinta. They enjoy getting away in the summer months to do some traveling, most recently to Ireland for golf. Winch's parents spend some time in the desert during the winter to play some golf and enjoy some time with the Winch family.

After 15 years, Winch feels he has a home at Andalusia and intends to stay as long as they will allow him, he says. He is comfortable with the management and knows most of the members by their first name. He still enjoys following the Edmonton Oilers and watches the games often with his son Jackson. As he looks back, he is glad he gave up the hockey stick for a golf club.

Today, his namesake and legacy are prominently associated with golf course design, with Nicklaus being one of the premier golf course architects around the world.

In the mid-1960s, Pete Dye, a longtime friend, invited Nicklaus to join him on a site visit at The Golf Club in suburban Columbus, Ohio. During the visit, Dye asked Nicklaus his opinion on the design work taking place. This piqued Nicklaus' interest in the course architecture process. A few years later, Charles Fraser at Sea Pines Resort asked Nicklaus to design a course for him in Hilton Head, South Carolina. Nicklaus invited Pete Dye to collaborate, and Nicklaus' first design, Harbour Town Golf Links, was born. The course opened in 1969 with a PGA Tour event and has hosted an event every year for the past 54 ensuing years. For the first few years of Nicklaus' design career, all of his projects were collaborations with either Pete Dye or Desmond Muirhead.

Today, Nicklaus plays a lot less golf but is as involved as ever in course design. He is the force behind close to 320 courses in as many as 45 countries. Most Nicklaus-designed courses are in the United States, with many other courses found in Asia, Australia, Canada, Europe, and Mexico.

Coachella Valley players pay homage to The Golden Bear every time they take a swing at The Club at Morningside in Rancho Mirage (1981), Toscana Country Club in Indian Wells (2004, and North Course 2005); and the famous PGA West in La Quinta, private and resort courses (1987).

Inspired by his love of the Masters Tournament and the beauty of Augusta National Golf Club, Nicklaus envisioned something similar for the golf and sports fans in his Central Ohio hometown. That led to his creation in 1976 of the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, played at his Ohio gem of Muirfield Village Golf Club in Dublin, just outside of Columbus. Nicklaus engaged Desmond Muirhead for his land-planning experience, and the Top-100 course opened in 1974. Muirfield Village is the only course to have hosted the Ryder Cup (1987), the Solheim Cup (1998), and the President's Cup (2013).


The course was officially dedicated on Memorial Day, May 27, 1974, with an exhibition match between Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf. Nicklaus carded a 6-under-par 66, which stood as the course record until 1979. The forerunner to this tournament, the Columbus Pro-Am, was held from 1966 through 1975 at Scioto Country Club, the Columbus course where he first learned to play the game of golf. The inaugural Memorial Tournament was held at Muirfield Village in 1976. The tournament has become one of the most prestigious events on the PGA Tour and is among the eight Signature Events, occupying an elite position in terms of a larger purse (\$20 million), smaller field and more FedExCup points.

The Memorial Tournament amplifies the PGA Tour's philanthropic focus through its relationships with myriad Central Ohio charities such as the Nationwide Children's Hospital. Since 1976, the Memorial Tournament has raised more than \$55 million in charity donations, with nearly \$40 million going to Nationwide Children's.

Other notable Nicklaus courses include Palmilla Golf Club in Los Cabos, Mexico (1992), The Challenge at Manele (now known as Manele Golf Course) in Lanai City, Hawaii (1993), Cabo del Sol in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, Ocean Course (1994), Sun Belgravia Golf Club in Nukata, Japan (1996), King & Bear Golf Club in St. Augustine, Florida (2000), The Bear's Club in Jupiter, Florida (2000), Monte Rei Golf and Country Club in the Eastern Algarve, Portugal (2007), Killeen Castle Golf Resort in Dunshaughlin, Ireland (2008), Puerto Los Cabos in Punta Gorda, Mexico (2008), Quivira in Los Cabos, Mexico (2014), Michlifen Resort & Golf in Ifrane, Morocco (2018), Nicklaus Club Beijing in China (2014), Tseleevo Golf Polo Club in Moscow, Russia (2008) and hundreds of others.

Nicklaus is the mastermind behind Sherwood Country Club in Thousand Oaks, California, designed and built for industrialist David Murdock in the late 1980s, which was updated in 2016 to reduce water use by 25 percent. Other California favorites include Ruby Hill Golf Club in Pleasanton (1996), Coyote Creek Golf Club

in San Jose (1999), Pasadera Country Club in Monterey (2000), Mayacama Golf Club in Santa Rosa (2001), and Montecito Country Club in Santa Barbara (2019).

Since late 2022, Nicklaus' energy has been directed towards designing courses for clients through his firm, 1-JN, a subsidiary of the Nicklaus Family Office in Juno Beach, Florida. His motivation today remains the same as when he started in the 1960s.

When asked what drives his interest in designing, Nicklaus says, "I like the creativity. I like taking what I've learned and putting it on a piece of ground for people to enjoy."

As for the nexus between the design process and improved play on courses he's designed, he says, "I get to understand more what water does, what wind does, what turf does, and I can take all the knowledge and apply it to the golf game. If you're paying any attention at all to these elements, you see that they help shape the outcome."

His main goal when embarking on a golf course design is "to create a product that serves the purpose of the owner and what they want it to do, whether it's a public course, resort course, private, or whatever his / her objectives are. A good golf course is one that aligns with what the owner wants. That's why they are paying me—to get what they want."

He pointed out that Castle Pines Golf Club in Colorado, one of his designs which opened in 1981, recently underwent a significant renovation. Following a visit there this past August, Nicklaus notes that Castle Pines Club Chairman and President George Solich is hands-on when it comes to direct involvement. Nicklaus embraces the engagement. He appreciates knowing what management wants and what they want to see.

He says, "That's my job, to help them accomplish their goals. Sometimes I have to talk them out of certain things, and sometimes they actually help to give me some direction."

Nicklaus enjoys collaborating with his family on designing golf courses. He says, "It's fun to have your family involved in your business endeavors. I didn't push my boys into golf, but they all became golf professionals. And I've got a couple of pretty good players. Some of my grandchildren are interested in getting involved in golf course design, and we are mentoring them right now."

He enjoys looking ahead to future projects, saying, "I get to keep doing one of the things that makes me happy — bringing new golf courses to life and making old ones new again. My goal has always been to create courses that challenge tour professionals yet still provide an enjoyable experience for the many golfers whose love for the game might be greater than their ability. I also try to respect the natural environment that existed before I showed up with a pencil and paper in hand. I am involved in some great projects at the moment."

As for his favorite golf course that he did not design? Nicklaus said that if he had one more round to play and it wasn't on a course he created, it would be at famed Pebble Beach Golf Links on California's Monterey Peninsula.

IMPACT IS THE TOPIC OF THE LAST TWO MONTH. See last months articles in DESERT GOLFER "archives" for part 1 & all my previous years of golf tips are located on the DESERT GOLFER website as well. The three golf impact position photos, I feel are the best way to see & feel the 3 different golf impact positions. Let's take a look at them so you can feel a better impact position today.



The golf impact positions 3 (three) photos:

- Correct (body to the left center impact rod)
- Incorrect (body falling back or leaning
- Incorrect (body / chest in front of the golf ball at impact)

Place 3 alignment rods in the ground. See the three photos...try to feel to get to the center impact rod & stay left.

Correct/more consistent impact position:

- See my body to the LEFT INTO MY BLACK IMPACT BAG
- Positions to look or feel:



- The CHEST over the ball
- The HIPS turning toward the "LEFT
- The SHOULDERS and entire BODY feeling toward the "LEFT FOOT"
- The WEIGHT transfer (weight feels into left side)
- The LEFT & RIGHT FOREARM facing the target
- The GRIP facing toward the "BALL START LINE"

At amazing feeling golf impact position you might feel the following:

- Compression
- Solid feeling
- Ball flies farther then ever
- Consistency
- Accuracy
- Sounds amazing

If you fall back (BODY IN THE BACK of the impact rod), you will get the following golf shots:

- · High Right
- · Block Right
- Skull
- Thin
- Chunks
- Tops
- No distance
- · No accuracy

If your body is IN FRONT OF THE GOLF BALL AT IMPACT, you will get the following golf shots:
• Skull

- Topped
- No distance
- Shank
- Hosel rockets
- Ball driven into the ground
- A lot of frustration on this side of the ball

BEGINNER GOLFER DRILLS:

- 7 Iron & an impact bag (fill it with old golf towels ½ to ¾ full)
- In the backyard feel like your 7 iron goes into the impact bag
- Do 10 sets of 7 iron into the impact bag in small swings (1/2 swings & small speed)

INTERMEDIATE – ADVANCED **GOLFER DRILLS:**

- Work on your impact
- · Work on your weight transfer
- 7 iron (50 shots . . . 1 leg)
- 7 iron (100 shots...other leg)
- 7 iron (50 shots...1 hand)
- •7 iron (100 shots ...other hand)

it has brought the cowabunga spirit to the Coachella Valley – no ocean needed.

The upscale adventure offers a resort experience with all levels of surf lessons, luxury cabanas, cozy daybeds, top notch food and drink, a relaxing lazy river and a heated lounge pool. The Club invites guests to bask under the sunny desert skies while drinks flow from poolside bars, with options for food, wave-watching and relaxation as well as riding the waves in full surf immersion.

Guests can surf an engineered wave that ranges from two to seven feet, with the length of each ride lasting from seven to 11 seconds. Everyone from beginner to pro can get in on the action.

The concept for the 21-acre surf club started in 2018, when prosurfer Cheyne Magnusson, who led to the creation of BSR Cable Park Surf Resort in Waco, Texas, partnered with pro surf icon Kalani Robb to build a next-generation wave prototype in what was previously the







Wet 'N' Wild waterpark in Palm Springs. In 2019, they completed the layout and invited Vinny Smith, the general partner of the Palm Springs Surf Club, to come test it for himself. Smith brought in hotel developers Tim and Colin O'Byrne to help create what is the final product today.

As for water usage, the Club uses just one percent of the water volume required by a typical golf course while generating over 70 percent of its energy resources in-house.

One of the biggest draws is the opportunity to take a private surf lesson. Guests reserve the entire surf pool for one- or two-hour sessions, for private groups of up to 12 people. Each lesson can be fully customized with a favorite wave on repeat or by switching the wave settings on demand. The selection includes A-frames, rights and lefts, the clean easy tube, the slab, and others.

Three levels of A-frames are available: intermediate, advanced and pro. The one-hour A-frames offer a split peak experience in which two surfers can ride in opposite directions on the same wave, with a closeout section for a finishing maneuver. For intermediate surfers, there are six wave sets with 15 second intervals between waves with just over two minutes between sets.

Advanced A-frames are the closest thing to splitting the peak at a local beach break on a good day. The waves are punchy enough for any surfer to throw tail on while still being easy enough for a weekend warrior to succeed. This is the favorite setting for semi and former pros. Pro A-frames feature five wave sets with a slab-like takeoff and an eight second interval between waves, breaking left and right. Surfers can expect rapid drop-ins, challenging barrel sections, performance turns mid wave and airs on the end section. The wave faces range from a head high takeoff to a shoulder high end section.

The lefts and rights extend the length of ride in the pool by about three seconds and are user-friendly for intermediate to pro. They offer a quick barrel and hold the face throughout the ride, with a playful end section that is great for laybacks. For the more technical surfer, the blow tail reverse has been a favorite, thrown out as a six-wave set with 22 seconds between waves and one minute and twenty seconds between sets.

The Beginner Waikiki will make every surfer envision a day on the south shore of Oahu. The Waikiki is the ideal wave for those who want to experience the sensation of riding on a board in the early stages of their surfing journey. For surfers skilled enough to angle and



go down the line, the wave has an open face on the outside edge as it peels along the reef.

For anyone more motivated by couch surfing, luxury cabanas beckon. Nestled alongside the surf scene, cabanas come equipped with flat screen televisions and are fully serviced by the PSSC hospitality team. Each full-day cabana reservation covers eight guests (all ages) and includes four general admission passes, providing exclusive access to heated dip pools just steps away.

Cozy daybeds are also available for rental, including an umbrella and cozy seating. The exclusive VIP daybeds feature upgraded luxury textiles and décor, creating an oasis on an island in the midst of the lazy river and the calming lounge pool.

During football season, surfers can catch games on big screens at the surf pool, on the Island Bar in the lounge pool daybed area, in the restaurant, and on all screens throughout the park all day every Sunday. The waterslide and splash pad will re-open in spring, bringing an even greater authentic water park experience.

Amala restaurant serves sustainable bites, and guests who wish to visit for dine-in only can just stop by Amala and skip the park entrance fee altogether. There are three full bars on site, pouring craft cocktails and draft beer. Low key nibbles are offered at Drifter's, adjacent to the pool.

Day-use lockers are available for rental, and surfers are welcome to bring their own boards or rent from the in-house shop. General admission is \$21.20 for adults and \$11 for kids (3-13 years). Riding the wave starts at \$100. Surf's up! • Written by Alison Elsner




The most immaculate course in the desert scores high ratings ... By Alison Elsner

It's a winning concept, and one that has struck a chord, so to speak, with valley residents. Big Rock Pub and Golf offers a lively amalgam of activity all centered around dining, drinking, watching live entertainment, and playing plenty of exceptional golf.

Food and beverage director Stephanie McCormack says, "Big Rock Pub is a hybrid of outstanding golf, entertainment, food, scenic views and unique memorabilia. We even have a beer garden which adds to the laid-back atmosphere and the excitement for all of our guests."

The Big Rock Golf Club at Indian Springs is arguably one of the primary attractions here, featuring an 18-hole public golf course. Every Friday night, Electric Feel takes over from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. On December 7, The Refills will play country and rock; on December 14, The Red Hot Cholo Peppers will play 90s tunes; on December 21, guests are invited to the Ugly Christmas Sweater contest while listening to classic rock; on December 28, Anthem Road plays high energy 80s music; and on New Year's Eve, the party will ring in the new year with Monark Band.

On January 3, Wyte Guy performs hair metal; January 11 welcomes the Brad Mercer Band for classic rock; January 18 highlights top 40 with Funked Martini; and January 25 features Flash Back Boyz with the best in classic rock. Tunes play on a state-of-the-art sound system throughout the pub, and there's a dance floor in front of the main stage which sees an abundance of friendly foot traffic. The surf and turf is especially delectable, with prime New York strip and lobster tail, accompanied by crispy potatoes, bok choy and chermoula verde. Guests will do well to share a bottle of Post & Beam chardonnay by Far Niente 2022.

The food and warm atmosphere makes La Quinta Cliffhouse the perfect desert dining destination.
