BNP Paribas Open

Up-and-Coming Stars Shine in Tennis Paradise

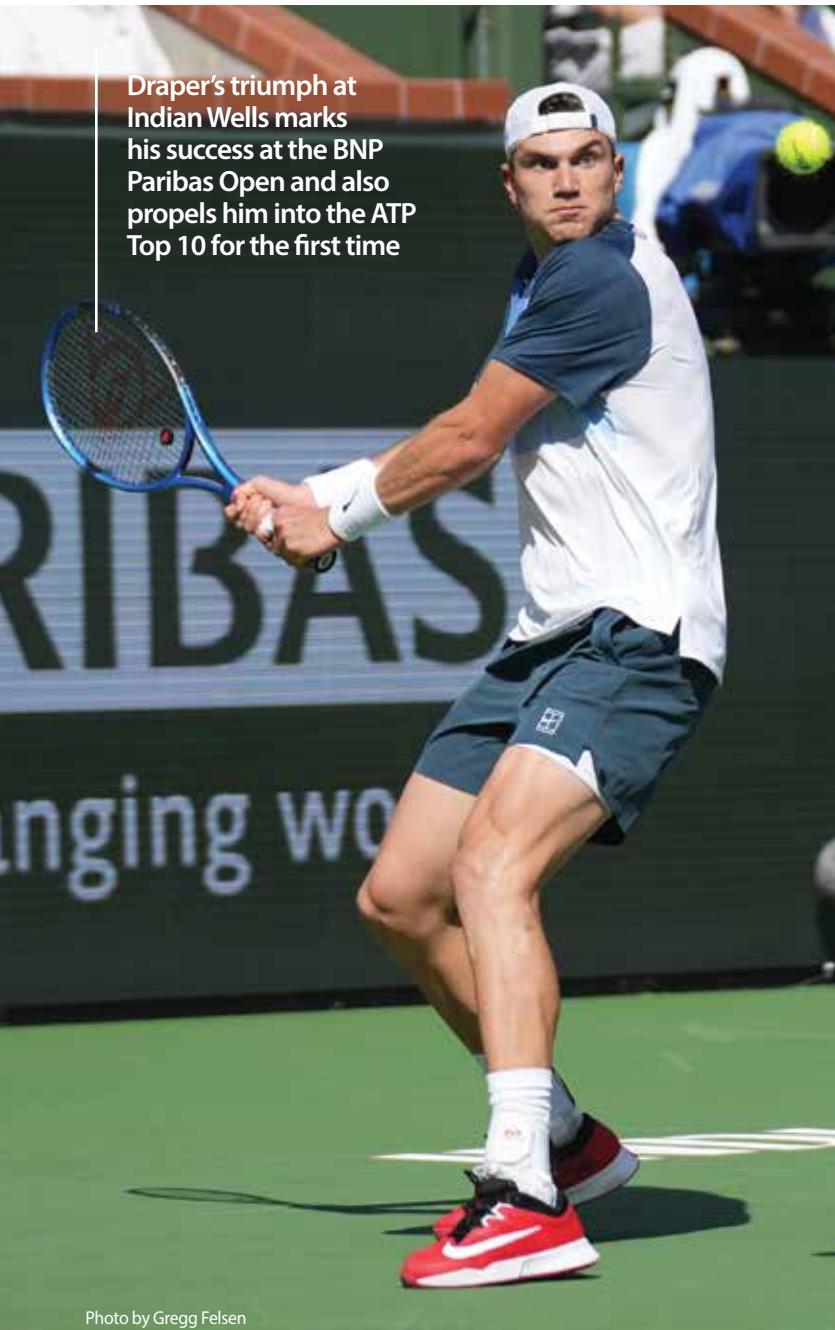

The game's rising talent blossomed during the "Fifth Slam," held from March 2-16.

This year, 504,268 tennis fans gathered together at Indian Wells Tennis Garden to witness the BNP Paribas Open firsthand.

While helping to break the tournament's all-time attendance record, every fan knew they observed something very special during the last two weeks: the potential beginning of tennis's next chapter.

First off, the men's singles final featured two players aged 23 or under for the first time since 2009. Secondly, 17-year-old Mirra Andreeva became the youngest BNP Paribas Open singles female champion since 1999.

It was a magical week, a week that possibly provided fans a preview of what's to come. "Tennis Paradise" (Indian Wells Tennis Garden's nickname) offered exactly that yet again—from the Garden's pristine beauty, to the historical, thrilling, awe-inspiring matches that occurred for two weeks.

Here is a look back at the magic that transpired, which may very well set the tone for the rest of 2025.

Draper Shocks the Tennis World

There were certainly signs that 23-year-old Jack Draper was on the verge of a career-defining moment. Prior to his victory at the BNP Paribas Open, he had won two ATP Tour titles and risen to No. 14 in the PIF ATP Rankings. In addition, he reached the 2024 US Open's semifinals.

But few people expected him to defeat two-time defending champion Carlos Alcaraz 6-1, 0-6 and 6-4 in the BNP Paribas Open's semifinals. Nor did they predict he'd win the finals so effortlessly, while accumulating a 6-2, 6-2 record against 21-year-old Holger Rune in 69 minutes—the BNP Paribas Open's fastest men's singles final in at least 10 years.

However, Draper knew what he was capable of. He fully understood what he had overcome to be in a position to win. And, above all else, he believed he could triumph.

"I've put in a lot of work over time," he said in reflection. "I'm so grateful to be able to play, my body feeling healthy, to feel great in the mind."

After overcoming various injuries in 2023, Draper struggled to explain what the victory meant to him, and for good reason. First, he's only the 11th lefty to win the BNP Paribas Open's men's singles title. Second, he's just the fifth British male to claim an ATP Tour title victory. Finally, he's the second-youngest British male to reach the world rankings' top 10.

"The amount of adversity I've been through... it's an emotional feeling to know how much you've gone through, and to say I'm going to be No. 7 in the world," he emphasized. "I can't tell you how much that means to me."

A Teenage Sensation

Some could argue it was a David versus Goliath situation. 17-year-old Mirra Andreeva was set to compete against world No. 1 Aryna Sabalenka. How could a less experienced player possibly defeat such an established one?

Yet, upon further observation, Andreeva's 2-6, 6-4, 6-3 victory against Sabalenka in the BNP Paribas Open's women's singles finals wasn't overly surprising. The win was her second-straight WTA 1000 event triumph, after all.

Due to her conquest, Andreeva has now won 12 straight WTA 1000 matches, the youngest to do so since 2009. She's also the youngest female to win the BNP Paribas Open in 26 years.

The third-youngest BNP Paribas Open singles female champion in history, Andreeva rose to No. 6 in the world rankings after her victory. Additionally, she's the youngest female to ever attain back-to-back WTA 1000 finals triumphs.

Of equal importance, Andreeva is only the third player, aged 17 or younger, to defeat the world's top two ranked players in a WTA singles event. During the semifinals, she beat world No. 2 and defending champion Iga Świątek, too.

Without question, Andreeva is achieving significant feats at a considerably rapid pace. When asked if her success was occurring too quickly, she didn't seem bothered by the pace at all though.

"I like it. If it's happening fast, [I'll] take it," she stressed. "It's not bad to win two tournaments in a row."

She also showed the world her humor shortly after winning. "I want to thank myself," she said. "I thank myself for fighting until the end and always believing in myself."

Doubles Champions Relish Victories

Much like Draper and Andreeva, the 2025 BNP Paribas Open's women's doubles champions, Asia Muhammad and Demi Schuurs, believed in themselves as well.

The primary reasons? Unlike the singles champions, Muhammad and Schuurs have definitely "been there, done that," so to speak, as they had already claimed 11 and 19 WTA doubles titles before the BNP Paribas Open, respectively.

While reflecting on their 6-2, 7-6(4) defeat of Tereza Mihalíková and Olivia Nicholls, Muhammad and Schuurs were extremely pleased, especially considering that it was only their third WTA 1000 event as a pairing.

"We lost just one set," Schuurs said. "We had an unbelievable tournament. We [are] very happy."

Likewise, World No. 1 men's doubles players—Marcelo Arévalo and Mate Pavić—were very happy with their performances, too. With their conquest, Pavić became the only active men's doubles player with 40 victories, after all. Meanwhile, Arévalo won his 14th doubles title and became the BNP Paribas Open's first-ever Central American winner.

"You always dream to win any title, but especially Indian Wells," Pavić reflected. "It's the so-called 'Fifth Slam.' You want to have that one in the books."

Tim and Twanna Rogers' Exclusive Thermal Club Racetrack: A Thrilling 2025 IndyCar Grand Prix

The 2025 IndyCar Grand Prix at the Thermal Club, held at the exclusive and private club founded Tim and Twanna Rogers, will be remembered as one of the most thrilling and strategic races in recent memory. Not only did the event showcase fierce competition among some of the sport's top drivers and teams, but it also marked a historic milestone — the first time in five years that a driver managed to claim back-to-back victories at this prestigious event.

The Grand Prix, set at the breathtaking Thermal Club racetrack in Southern California, brought together elite teams like Andretti Autosport, McLaren, A.J. Foyt Racing, and Chip Ganassi Racing, among others. The 2025 race was a testament to both the drivers' abilities and the challenge of the track itself, offering a unique blend of technical difficulty and high-speed excitement.

The Thermal Club racetrack, with its stunning desert views and demanding corners, has become one of the most highly regarded circuits in motorsport. Designed to challenge even the best drivers, the track's 3.1-mile, 17-turn layout provides a perfect setting for an IndyCar race. For the 2025 event, Tim and Twanna Rogers' vision for this exclusive racetrack came to life once again, delivering an incredible atmosphere and an unforgettable race.

In a remarkable turn of events, Alex Palou, the talented Spaniard from Chip Ganassi Racing, took home the victory in the 2025 Thermal Club Indy Grand Prix, securing back-to-back wins at the track. Palou's performance was nothing short of exceptional. Having also won the 2024 race at the Thermal Club, he became the first driver in five years to clinch consecutive victories at this event, the last being Scott Dixon in 2020.

Palou's win was a testament to his consistency and precision under pressure. Starting from a mid-field position, he didn't let the challenges of the circuit or the fierce competition from drivers like Pato O'Ward of McLaren and Christian Lundgaard of Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing shake his confidence. As the race unfolded, Palou kept his head down, executing a perfect strategy and relying on a flawless pit stop sequence to close the gap to the front-runners. His race craft and ability to adapt to changing conditions were on full display as he surged ahead in the final laps.

As the race entered its closing stages, it became clear that Palou had mastered the combination of tire management and track positioning

that was required to win at Thermal. With Pato O'Ward leading for much of the race, Palou was able to capitalize on tire degradation and make a daring move in the closing laps, stealing the lead and ultimately securing his second consecutive victory at the iconic circuit.

Pato O'Ward, who had shown immense pace throughout the race, ultimately came up short in his pursuit of the win, finishing in second place. The Mexican driver, known for his aggressive driving style and remarkable overtaking ability, led for much of the race and appeared on track for his first win of the season. O'Ward's performance was one of the highlights of the day, with his McLaren team executing a near-perfect strategy to give him a significant lead.

However, tire degradation and the intense pressure from Palou in the final laps saw O'Ward lose his advantage. The battle between O'Ward and Palou in the last 10 laps was a nail-biting affair, with O'Ward doing everything he could to defend his position. But despite his best efforts, he could not match Palou's final push and finished just behind him, missing out on a hard-earned victory. O'Ward's second-place finish was still an impressive result, keeping him firmly in the championship hunt as the season progressed.

Christian Lundgaard, driving for Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing, was the surprise package of the weekend, securing an outstanding third-place finish. The Danish driver's performance was one of the standout stories of the race, as he managed to stay consistent throughout the event and avoided the mistakes that befell some of his competitors. Lundgaard's ability to navigate the tight and technical corners of the Thermal Club circuit allowed him to make key moves during the race, and he capitalized on his rivals' tire wear to climb up the leaderboard in the final laps.

Lundgaard's third-place finish marked his first podium of the 2025 season and was a significant milestone in his IndyCar career. His patient and calculated approach to the race made him a strong contender in the later stages, and despite not having the raw pace of O'Ward or Palou, he proved his worth by holding off the pressure and finishing ahead of other heavy hitters. His podium result earned him a well-deserved \$500,000, a crucial payout that will help propel him forward in his championship pursuit.

The 2025 IndyCar Grand Prix at Thermal Club was a masterclass in strategic racing, with teams employing a range of tactics to stay



competitive on the demanding circuit. The tight, technical nature of the track made overtaking difficult, so pit strategy, tire management, and fuel conservation played a massive role in determining the outcome.

The race also showcased a battle of the teams, with Andretti Autosport, McLaren, and Chip Ganassi Racing all vying for supremacy. While Colton Herta and Romain Grosjean from Andretti Autosport both showed flashes of brilliance, they ultimately couldn't match the pace of the top three drivers. McLaren's Alexander Rossi and Felix Rosenqvist also fought hard but struggled with tire management issues, while Kyle Kirkwood from A.J. Foyt Racing had a promising start but couldn't capitalize on the tight conditions.

The Thermal Club race also brought attention to how important it was for drivers to maintain focus over the course of the 85-lap race. Even with a dominant performance from O'Ward and strong pushes from Palou and Lundgaard, the race remained wide open with strategy being the key to success. The final laps were a display of both patience and aggression, with tire management proving to be the deciding factor for many.

As the race concluded, the top three finishers took home significant payouts, which not only reflected their results but also highlighted the prestige of the event at the Thermal Club.

Alex Palou (1st) – \$1.2 million

Palou's back-to-back victory earned him a whopping \$1.2 million in prize money, including a substantial bonus for his repeat performance at the Thermal Club. The victory bolstered his position in the championship standings and cemented his reputation as one of the sport's brightest talents.

Pato O'Ward (2nd) – \$750,000

O'Ward's performance, despite his heartbreak in the final laps, still earned him a solid payout of \$750,000. His efforts to hold the lead throughout much of the race and fend off Palou's late charge were commendable, and the payout will help keep him in the hunt for the title as the season progresses.

Christian Lundgaard (3rd) – \$500,000

Lundgaard's third-place finish was a breakthrough result for the Danish driver, marking his first podium of the season. His \$500,000 payout reflected the strong drive and strategy that earned him a place on the podium at one of IndyCar's most challenging circuits.





Firebirds Forward

John Hayden

helps the Coachella Valley Firebirds slide into success

The inaugural team member combines physical dominance with an Ivy League education

As an “OG” of the Coachella Valley Firebirds in the American Hockey League (AHL), forward John Hayden has come to be revered as one of the desert’s hometown heroes, both on and off the ice. While under contract to the Seattle Kraken of the National Hockey League (NHL), Hayden’s stellar performance coupled with his affable, down to earth manner make him a favorite of fans and sports enthusiasts.

Hayden has the smarts to back up his athletic prowess. Having graduated from Yale University (where he served as captain of the Bulldogs during his senior year), Hayden says, “It was an amazing experience. By studying political science I was able to learn so much in a comprehensive way. Plus, the networking was high caliber.”

In his first full season with the Chicago Blackhawks in the 2018–19 season, Hayden played in a fourth-line role, contributing with three goals and five points in 54 games. On June 22, 2019, at the 2019 NHL entry draft, Hayden was traded by the Blackhawks to the New Jersey

Devils in exchange for John Quenneville. In the 2019–20 season, Hayden played in 43 games for the New Jersey Devils, playing in a fourth-line forward role recording three goals and an assist. Hayden was released to free agency on October 8, 2020.

On the following day, Hayden was signed by the Arizona Coyotes after agreeing to a one-year, \$750,000 contract. In his lone season with the Coyotes in the pandemic-shortened 2020–21 season, Hayden made 29 appearances, posting two goals and five points.

The Coyotes released him as a free agent on July 29, 2021, at which point Hayden was signed to a one-year, two-way contract with the Buffalo Sabres. On July 14, 2022, he was signed as a free agent to a one-year, two-way contract with the Seattle Kraken.

The 30 year-old Hayden was born in Chicago but immediately moved to Denver, Colorado before settling in Greenwich, Connecticut with his family when he was eight years old. During the summer off-season, he looks forward to spending time with family who divide their time between Greenwich and New York City.

He says, “When I go home, I get to visit with the family pet, a chow named Chowder and an English bulldog named Boomer.” He also covets his time back home with his parents and siblings, including his



entrepreneurial-minded brother who graduated from Wake Forest University and works in financial management. Hayden is especially proud of his sister Catherine, who has just launched her own golf apparel line, Honey (honeygolf.com), in partnership with former University of North Carolina field hockey teammates, Marissa and Ellen, who together helped lead the team to two NCAA titles.

Hayden married his wife, Lauren, last summer, and together they live in La Quinta with a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel named Briar.

As for his time on the ice and in the rink, Hayden says, "It's been great working with Lax [Coach Derek Laxdal]. He reads the room well. He and the trainers deserve a lot of credit for carrying us in

the right direction. He's brought us a lot of success, and I'm really proud of Dan and Jess [Dan Bylsma, former head coach, and Jessica Campbell, former assistant coach] moving back to Seattle. Stu [Bickel, assistant coach] and Zuli [Colin Zulianello, goaltending coach] are still here, and it's exciting that I'm one of the original five players going back to the inaugural season."

As for his favorite part of the game? Hayden says, "I love it right when we come out onto the ice. There's a certain intensity when the lights dim, and it's those first few moments skating out before things calm and the play begins."

He continues, "Home crowds here are the best in the AHL. I was able to get a taste of the playoffs last year, too. I love living here, and it's perfect for where I'm at in my life. There's a golf scene, a food scene, The Amex golf, BNP Paribas Open, concerts, and so many events going on all the time."

In his down time, Hayden loves to golf, which also reminds him of growing up in Greenwich. He and his wife Lauren have also been able to take advantage of weekend getaways to Joshua Tree, Laguna Beach, Carmel and Big Sur.

As much as he'd like to "stick around" here in the desert, Hayden says that his ultimate goal is to play in the NHL as long as he can and work on his game. "That's the reality I'm hoping to create."

Reflecting on what he considers to be a balanced life, Hayden concludes, "It's good here." ■ **Written by Alison Elsner**

I'm also excited about starting a scholarship at my Alma Mater Howard University. I recently returned to Howard and received my BFA in 2022 after being forced to drop out after my junior year in 1991 because I could no longer afford to pay tuition. The aim of my scholarship is to help students ease that burden."

He also proudly serves on the GOOD+ Foundation's Fatherhood Leadership Council and was inducted into the Class of 2017 Boys & Girls Club of America National Alumni Hall of Fame. Anderson has Type 2 diabetes and is an advocate for diabetes awareness and a spokesperson for the "Get Real About Diabetes" campaign. A lifelong supporter of his hometown, Compton California, Anderson received the 2023 Trailblazer Award from the Woodcraft Rangers to honor his achievements and support the next generation of youth in Los Angeles by the organization with core values of inclusion, access and expanded learning opportunities.

For Anderson, being able to bring awareness and raise monies for causes that mean so much to him via golf is simply put "a no brainer."

"I'm like a junkie. I'm hooked. My passion for the game goes deep," explains Anderson. "I started playing golf in my early 20's. I was probably 23 or 24. My father-in-law Alvin Stewart introduced the game to me. In a visit to see him, he took me to a driving range for the first time. He was a left-handed player but had one right-handed club in his bag (for the times he may have to hit right-handed shots on the course). He gave me that club to hit with and I fell in love with the game instantly!"

Anderson's "love" for the game has many facets including nature. "For me, just the opportunity to be outside and enjoying nature, I love it. It's you against the course. You're not competing against anyone other than yourself; you can't blame anyone else for not playing the right way. It's just you and the sticks, the tee and the ball," says Anderson. Playing golf daily would be his dream life but for now "Unfortunately work and travel keeps me from playing a lot of golf, I probably only play a few times a month which is hampering my handicap. I was once an 11.2 now it's a 15.4!"

Many might not know that Anderson achieved a Guinness World Records title for Longest 'usable' golf club, as seen in the Topgolf's original video series, Record Breakers. Featured in the series pilot, Anderson was tasked with hitting a golf ball, driving at least 25 m (82 ft, ¼ in), using a custom-made club extending 11.3 m (37 ft 1 in) which he did on his third try.

When asked about his game, Anderson quickly replies, "It's an addiction and I love it!"

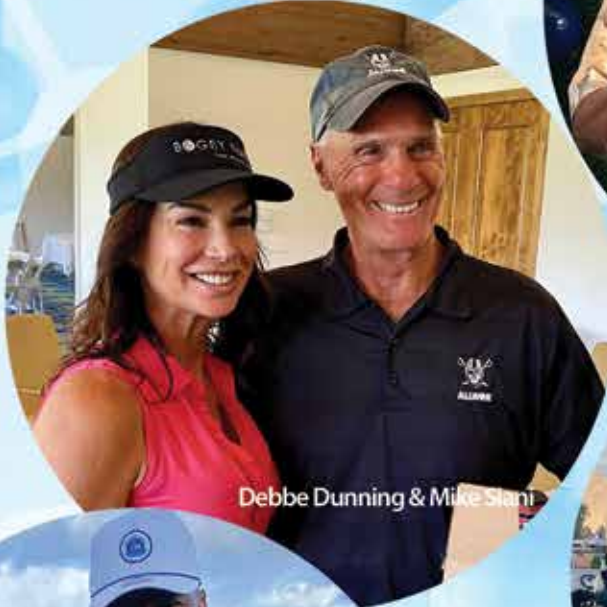

For those with a passion for golf and a penchant for celebrity events, the upcoming Coachella Valley Volunteers in Medicine (CVVIM) Celebrity Classic is calling your name. Taking place on May 3 and 4 at Bermuda Dunes Country Club, the event raises needed funds for the uninsured or underinsured in our communities who require healthcare.

The tournament is now in its fourth year and once again will showcase a field of celebrity participants. Four amateur players are paired with a celebrity golfer in each of the 21 groupings on Sunday, May 4 starting with a shotgun start at 9:30 a.m. Each player can buy-in for \$400 and be matched with one of this year's celebrities, including supermodel Kim Alexis, actors Debbe Dunning, Richard Karn, Carrie Barton Booth, Tohoru Masamune, Marc McClure, Ricco Ross, Geoff Pierson, Charlie Schlatter and other notables. Other high profile participants will include athletes Ann Meyers-Drysdale, Tim Harris (retired NFL player with the Green Bay Packers),

John Lambert (retired NBA player with the Cleveland Cavaliers), Mike Siani (NFL player with the Raiders) and so many more still to be announced.

John White from KESQ will also be in attendance, with KESQ News Channel 3 as a sponsor as well as Osborne Rincon CPAs, CB Wealth Management Group, Desert Orthopedic Center, John and Sandy Powell, Southwest Plumbing and John O'Toole and Arthur Rodriguez.

CVVIM event coordinator Mary Martin says, "Our goal is to fill up the field and get those golf carts occupied. This is not about the purse or the trophy, but rather it's a feel-good event that focuses on fun and charity." Sponsorships range from \$1,500 to \$10,000.

Martin, who previously served as tournament director for many years with The Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational, a well-known event in the Coachella Valley, has the toughest job of all: securing the stars. However, her extensive rolodex through her tenure with The Sinatra facilitates her ability to leverage relationships and gain commitments. In addition, several of the celebrities are members of Bermuda Dunes Country Club, including triathlete Chase McQueen and Joe Morrow, NHL player with the Pittsburgh Penguins.

In addition to the sequence of golf tees, players will find enthusiastic game stations that raise additional funds for the CVVIM healthcare cause through friendly contest-oriented activities, such as sampling margaritas and tequila shots, serving treats from a bakery station, and even downing Jello shots.

The main event is followed by an awards after-party and a late lunch at the club house.

Players can also look forward to the pairings party on the evening of May 3 starting at 6 p.m., where they meet and mingle with their celebrity partner, community members and other players enjoying savory appetizers provided by The Butler Did It.

Coachella Valley Volunteers in Medicine operates under the premise that everyone has the right to healthcare. CVVIM provides a local solution to a national and pervasive challenge: access to healthcare. Services include primary medical care, among many others, at no cost to adults in the Coachella Valley who are uninsured or under-insured and who are at 200 percent of poverty level.

As a community safety net, the CVVIM health centers treat the whole person

by addressing chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and arthritis. They also treat acute conditions, such as colds, flu, preventive medicine, diet, and emotional health. In addition to direct patient care, they offer health education and wellness programs, case management and community referrals for patients. Patients are encouraged to schedule appointments with the health center instead of visiting local hospital emergency rooms to receive care for non-life-threatening conditions. A visit to the VIM center avoids costly out-of-pocket expenses for uninsured patients, while providing them with high-quality, equitable care.

VIM is a member of Volunteers in Medicine, a national nonprofit alliance with more than 90 free clinics across the U.S., whose mission is to provide healthcare services in a compassionate, caring way to neighbors in need. Locally, CVVIM relies upon private donations and foundation grants, while not receiving any state or federal funding. Patients must be 18 years or above as well as residents of the Coachella Valley or Morongo Basin.

The first uninsured, low-income patients walked through the doors of VIM new

Health Center in November 2010. The only no-cost healthcare center in the Coachella Valley, it took three years of planning to make the dream a reality. A dedicated and diligent group of healthcare and community volunteers along with governmental leaders championed the cause of helping Inland Empire residents have access to medical care at the local level, and community support continues to support our population with healthcare access and treatment.

In February, Coachella Valley's Indian Wells Golf Resort was awarded one of the golf resort industry's highest honors, as it was named a "Distinguished Golf Destination."

A designation created by BoardRoom Magazine, in partnership with the Forbes Travel Guide, it is considered the most prestigious honor a resort and course—whether it's daily fee, public or semi-private—can receive.

To earn the merit-based designation, courses and resorts must excel in four key ways: amenities, facilities, service, and managers' and staff members' teamwork. Ever since the resort was founded in 1989, General Manager Robin Graf believes it has exceeded customers' expectations in each of these ways, among others.

"Indian Wells Golf Resort is a 'bucket list' golf destination," Graf stressed. "Its service is first class, and its championship golf courses are highly rated nationwide."

He added, "There is also a highly rated restaurant that's headlined by a celebrity chef. It serves as a host of many weddings and social and corporate events."

As golfers prepare for the taxing layout, they'll do so in privacy, as there aren't any homes or roads on the course (just like The Celebrity Course). As a result, they can focus fully on the course's stunning

mountain vista views—whenever they aren't concentrating on their shots, that is.

Set to be renovated during the next few months, the Players Course will be even more difficult in the future. In turn, it will continue to host professional events like the 2024 Epson Tour Championship, which it held last October.

"The championship was a wonderful opportunity to showcase Indian Wells Golf Resort to the LPGA Tour and its upcoming stars," Graf stated. "It showed the resort is worthy of a high-level golf event."

When golfers aren't enjoying The Celebrity and Players Courses firsthand, Graf invites them to experience Indian Wells Golf Resort's restaurants, too.

"We have everything from banquets, to golfer-friendly food at our food truck and Fairway Grille, to our Celebrity Chef restaurant, which has an outstanding menu, décor, and course and mountain views," Graf said. "Our wedding pavilion also showcases our natural surroundings' beauty."

He added, "Therefore, the resort is a 'do not miss' experience. It should be part of anybody's future golf vacation."

On Sunday night at the Heroes Challenge Awards Banquet, Stater Bros. A Father's Legacy:

Selling and Promoting the First-ever Golf Carts



JR Thomas' Golf Cars continues to honor Bobby Thomas Sr., a golf cart pioneer

In 1958, Jim Doty created the first-ever fleet golf cart, known as the Turf Rider. A three-wheel vehicle, the cart was manufactured in Redlands, about an hour from Rancho Mirage.

Doty's concept soon changed the golf industry forever, thanks to the marketing of individuals like Bobby Thomas Sr., a caddy at Rancho Mirage's Thunderbird Country Club. Approached by former U.S. Ambassador Leonard Firestone, who was having ongoing hip pain that affected his ability to walk 18 holes, Thomas Sr. referred the politician to Doty.

From there, several well-known individuals followed suit, as celebrities like Desi Arnaz purchased Turf Riders from Thomas Sr.—through Doty—as well. Noticing the steady rise in fleet golf cart interest and the potential it had for a business enterprise, Thomas Sr. soon created a custom golf cart business in Rancho Mirage, one that became renowned across the U.S.

Before long, Presidents Dwight Eisenhower and Gerald Ford were customers, as was Chief of Protocol Leonore Annenberg, Rat Pack member Frank Sinatra and countless other socialites and celebrities, along with professional athletes.

"We sold and rebuilt all of the Annenberg Estate golf carts, which had to be cream white," says JR Thomas, Thomas Sr.'s son. "We called them Wimbledon White, which sounded very classy."

He adds, "One day, Mrs. Annenberg came to our showroom and ordered 10 custom vehicles. Of course, she had to make sure we knew the paint code. All of the elaborate logos were hand painted by one of our contracted artists in a bright yellow!"

The stories, regarding the Thomas family's clientele list, are truly endless. For instance, Bob Hope utilized Thomas Sr.'s shop for repairs, as he had a flatbed golf cart that was used to move champagne cases. In addition, Ol' Blue Eyes once walked into Thomas Sr.'s showroom all alone and purchased two golf carts—one for himself and one for his wife.

"Back in the early 70s, Mr. Sinatra looked at a new model that resembled a Rolls Royce and said 'Five thousand dollars for a golf cart? I didn't pay \$5,000 for my first house!'. Then, as he was walking out, he turned around and asked, 'how much for this one?' My father replied, by saying it cost \$3,500," Thomas stresses.

He continues, "Frank said, 'that's more like it' and that he would



take that one. He also bought the Rolls Royce cart for \$5,000 for his 'old lady'!

Thomas Sr.'s celebrity clientele list continued to expand, as he created Western Golf Car Manufacturing Company in 1979 alongside Chris Haneal, Scott Stevens and his brother Eddie. Offering the first truly custom golf carts, the company supplied carts to all Bob Hope Charity Classic celebrity participants.

Consequently—from his encounters with Goldie Hawn, Dinah Shore and Sylvester Stallone, to his business deals with athletes like Wayne Gretzky, Arnold Palmer and Pete Sampras—it seems everyone knew him.

As an example of his own celebrity status, Thomas Sr. even has a star on the Palm Springs Walk of Stars, which was dedicated to him on December 11, 2007, eight years before he passed away at the age of 82.

Since his father's passing, JR has created his own business, JR Thomas' Golf Cars. Like his father, JR is known for his personality, as his likeability continues to attract some of the biggest names in sports and entertainment as clients.

"When golf carts were originally created, they were designed to help speed up play, while also letting handicapped golfers enjoy the game," he says, while reflecting on the last 67 years. "Since then, they have become faster and lighter, as they also have better brakes and suspensions, along with efficient, state-of-the-art electronics and lithium batteries."

More and more Palm Desert courses are also allowing golfers to drive up close to the greens and putt if they have doctor's notes, thereby ensuring nearly everyone can play the game. Not to mention, Palm Desert enables people to drive their golf carts on streets that have speed limits of 35 mph or less, as long as they've paid a \$20, two-year license fee.

As Thomas prepares for the future of the golf cart industry, he doesn't believe much will change overall, when compared to the early days of Doty's creativity and his father's promotional and sales ingenuity.



"The design and styles may change, from Bluetooth stereos and air-conditioned roofs, leading to more comfort and better experiences," Thomas says. "But I don't believe golf carts will change all that much, really."

Perhaps in this ever-changing world, this lack of significant change is good. Maybe efficiency, customer service and personality are still the key facets for a business's success?

While looking ahead to the coming months, Thomas is focused on these three main ingredients for longstanding customer loyalty, all while offering new custom golf carts, restored classic golf carts and golf cart rentals. Furthermore, he'll continue to maintain and repair clients' golf carts, while installing lithium batteries, too.

"To honor my father's memory, legacy and impact on the golf cart industry, JR Thomas' Golf Cars will provide high-end service to each of its customers—well into the future," he emphasizes. "After all, my father always told me if you don't take care of your customers, someone else will!" ■ **Written by Chris Lewis**



A Look Back at the 1955 and 1959 Ryder Cups

During the 1950s, Coachella Valley hosted two memorable Ryder Cups

Since 1927, less than two dozen golf courses in the United States have hosted the Ryder Cup, two of which are based in the Coachella Valley area: Thunderbird Country Club and Eldorado Country Club.

Without question, when it comes to the Ryder Cup, the future is looking bright for California. After all, it will be hosting the competition at San Francisco's The Olympic Club in 2033—the first time The Golden State has hosted it since 1959.

This statistic is truly astonishing, as California has hosted some of the most memorable major championships in golf history, from the 1982 U.S. Open (featuring Tom Watson's famous chip-in on Pebble

Beach Golf Links' 17th hole), to the 2008 U.S. Open (one of the most exciting majors of all time).

As Californians prepare to finally end this decades-long streak, here is a look back at the two Ryder Cups that have been held in the Coachella Valley: the 1955 and 1959 Ryder Cups.

1955 Ryder Cup: Thunderbird Country Club Hosts a U.S. Victory

In 1955, Rancho Mirage's Thunderbird Country Club was in its prime. Known for its association with the Ford Thunderbird (which was named after the club), it had become a haven for celebrities

and political figures. For example, President Dwight Eisenhower eventually became a member, paving the way for other presidents that would enjoy their time at the club, too.

Although the course was becoming more and more popular by that point in time, it became a globally known venue when it hosted the Ryder Cup. Due to grocery magnate Robert Hudson's influence, the course hosted one of the world's most popular sporting events only four years after it opened, becoming Coachella Valley's first-ever 18-hole course.

Led by playing captain Chick Harbert, who was well known for his match play success, as he won the 1954 PGA Championship when it was still a match play event, the American team dominated at the new layout, ultimately winning 8-4. Aside from Harbert's singles victory, four other team members especially contributed to the triumph: Tommy Bolt, Jack Burke Jr., Doug Ford and Sam Snead, each of whom had a 2-0 record. As a result of this quartet's success, Team USA won their seventh straight Ryder Cup.

Despite the loss, there were some positives for Great Britain and its playing captain Dai Rees, too. First, John Jacobs led the team with a 2-0 record, including a singles victory against Cary Middlecoff, who won the Masters Tournament earlier that year. In addition, Eric Brown, John Fallon and Arthur Lees all compiled 1-0 records.

Fast forward nearly 70 years later, and Thunderbird's layout is practically unrecognizable, as it has been remodeled extensively since then (in 1986 and 2021). However, regardless of these remodeling efforts, the memories of the 1955 Ryder Cup remain fully intact—and will forever be the club's shining moment.

"This was a monumental event for Thunderbird Country Club, one that only further increased its popularity," says Brett Draper, general manager. "The incredible stories of this Ryder Cup, as well as the legends that were involved with it, continue to be discussed at the club, no matter how much time passes by."

1959 Ryder Cup: American Dominance Continues in the Desert

Just four short years later, the Ryder Cup returned to Coachella Valley yet again, as a result of Robert Hudson's initiatives. Through Hudson's financial contributions, a practically new golf course—

Indian Wells' Eldorado Country Club, which opened in 1957—served as Ryder Cup host again.

Unlike in 1955, when the Americans were seeking their seventh successive Ryder Cup, momentum was not on Team USA's side in 1959, as Great Britain captured the 1957 Ryder Cup for the first time since 1933, winning 7.5 to 4.5. Nonetheless, whether they were motivated by playing on their home soil or were simply inspired to return to their winning ways, Team USA ensured this momentum didn't continue for Great Britain in 1959.

Motivated by playing captain Sam Snead, a Ryder Cup legend and seven-time major champion already, Team USA increased its victory margin even more, when compared to the 1955 matches, as they won 8.5 to 3.5. Aside from providing leadership and motivation, Snead also offered 1.5 critical points, as he won his singles match. In addition to Snead, Team USA was led by a dominant trio—1958 PGA Champion Dow Finsterwald, 1959 PGA Champion Bob Rosburg and Mike Souchak—who claimed six points, as they each had 2-0 records.

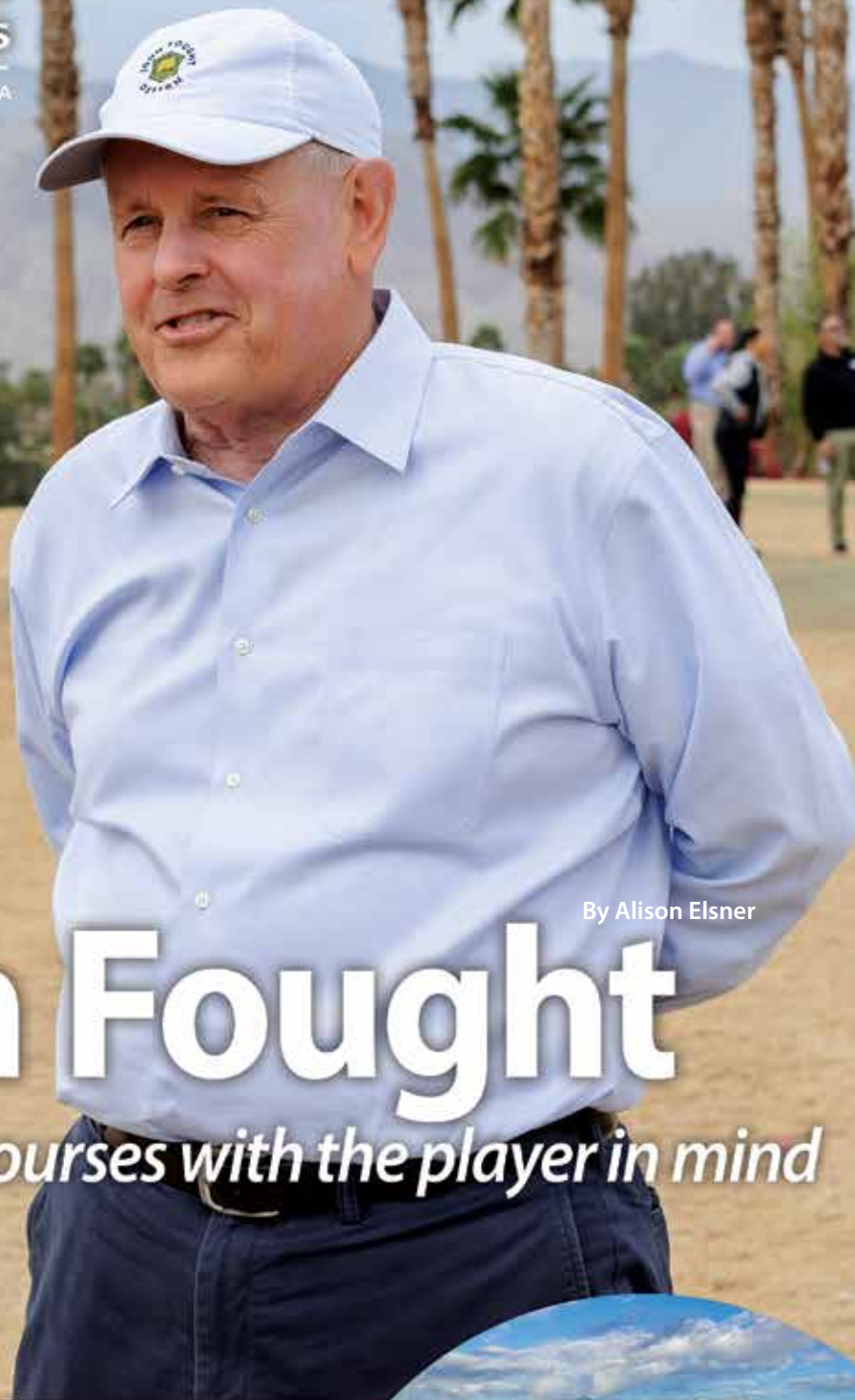
Some argued that Great Britain's loss was due to the team's arrival to Eldorado Country Club by bus from Los Angeles after their flight had severe turbulence. Others focused on the fact that only one team member, Peter Allis, had more than one point. Regardless of the reasons, the victory was certainly significant, and a wonderful memory for every Coachella Valley resident that witnessed it firsthand.

Much like Thunderbird, Eldorado Country Club is far different than it was in 1959. The primary reason? Tom Fazio renovated it considerably in 2001, as he transformed its layout from a very flat design to one that has much more terrain now, leading to a more challenging and visually appealing course. Despite the changes, one aspect of the club hasn't changed and likely never will—the lore of Slammin' Sammy's defining victory in the 1959 Ryder Cup, a remarkable era in Coachella Valley's storied golf history.

"It's an honor to know that Eldorado Country Club is one of only 21 clubs in the U.S. to have ever hosted the Ryder Cup," stresses Terry Beardsley, director of golf. "It's a key part of our club's history, a moment in time that will continue to positively impact it well into the future." ■ **Written by Chris Lewis**

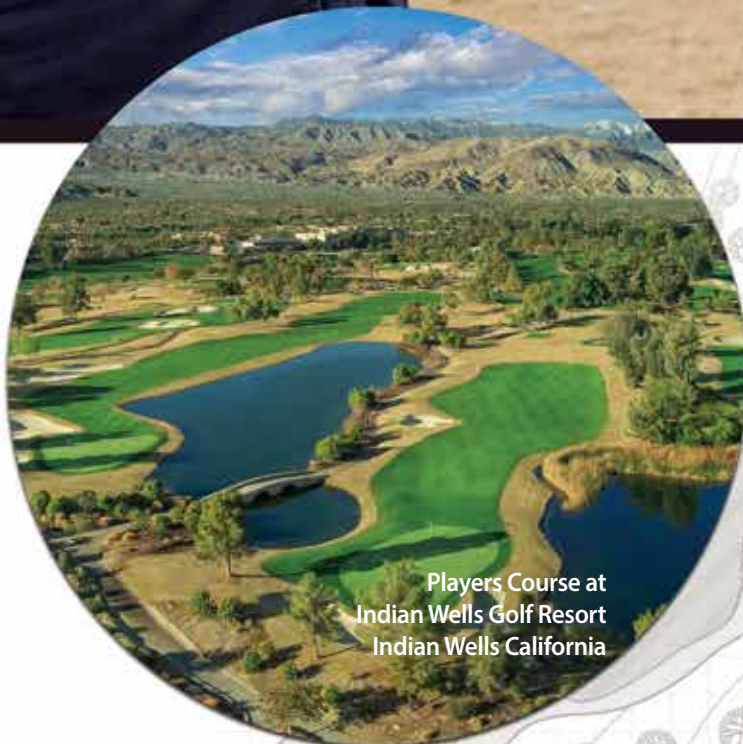
John Fought

Designs golf courses with the player in mind

Solving complex problems and making the design fit the land

Golf course architects have risen to the level of celebrity stardom in our culture, and for those who bring their vast pro golfing experience to the world of design, rightly so.

John Fought is a case in point. After a successful college golf career at Brigham Young University where he won the 1977 U.S. Amateur, Fought played on the PGA Tour full-time from 1979–1985. Fought (rhymes with boat) achieved a dozen top-10 finishes including two back-to-back wins in September 1979, the same year he received the PGA Tour Rookie of the Year award. His best finish in a major was a solo 5th at the 1983 PGA Championship. Since then, he has played in

a limited number of Nationwide Tour and Champions Tour events.

In 1985, Fought suffered spine and neck injuries which forced him to retire from full-time tour play. Despite an accounting degree earned in college, Fought launched his second career as a golf course architect by establishing John Fought Design in Scottsdale, Arizona.

He is currently preparing to begin a renovation of the Players Course at Indian Wells Golf Resort, owned by the city of Indian Wells, California in the Coachella Valley.

Fought created the Players Course in 2007, which features a classic American design complete with sculpted bunkers, generous fairway corridors, and undulating topography. Fought was able to seamlessly integrate tradition while delivering a modern approach with awe-inspiring views of the San Jacinto, Santa Rosa and San Bernardino mountain ranges.

He now returns to reconfigure the routing following adjustments being made with the property layout. His main task is to make space for two replacement holes which necessitates him building seven new holes from the existing course. He expects the course to be more walkable as well as more conducive to tournament play and professional events.

He explains, "The design work is interrelated so if I'm renovating two holes, it means all of the holes need to be revamped. This also means upgrades to the greens, tees and bunkers. It will be a different course when we're done, but I'm really excited about it. After all, golf courses aren't forever."

The Players Course is 7,376 yards, 300 yards longer than the neighboring Celebrity Course, though Celebrity's tightness and uphill approaches help even out the disparity. The "Cabernet" or back tees at Players are rated 75.3 and 139.

The Celebrity Course was designed by Clive Clark, with whom Fought enjoys a solid friendship. He says, "Clive and Linda are dear friends, and between us we are able to work with generations of golfers."

Fought's first official design was Pumpkin Ridge Golf Club in North Plains, Oregon, which stands out as a golf-centric escape in the Pacific Northwest. Other projects include the North Course at Moss Creek Golf Club in Hilton Head, South Carolina and course upgrades at Alpine Country Club in Highland, Utah as well as Ironwood Country Club's North Course in Palm Desert, California.

His award-winning designs also include Centennial Golf Course and The Reserve Vineyards and Golf Club (in Medford and Aloha, Oregon, respectively) as well as a restoration of an original Donald Ross design at Pine Needles Golf Club in Southern Pines, North Carolina. Other designs or collaborations include The Gallery Golf Club North and South courses in Tucson, Arizona (the North course hosted the 2000 Tucson Open and the South course hosted the WGC Match Play in 2007 and 2008). Fought also redesigned the Dogwood and Azalea courses at The Country Club of Jackson, Mississippi in 2008, host to the Sanderson Farms Championship on the PGA Tour since 2014.

Fought says, "I love what I do, especially as a former player. With golf course design, the scale can change, but renovation projects are always interesting. They are new and alive."

As with any golf course creators, Fought finds it difficult to select a favorite. However, he's currently enthused about a project at Windsong Farm Golf Club in Independence, Minnesota, where he is developing a new North Course. Windsong Farm is nationally recognized as one of the nation's top modern courses. In 2002, Fought, along with Minnesota's own Tom Lehman, completed the South Course and implemented major course improvements in 2015.

Next to golf, his preferred activity is spending time with his three grown children and being a grandfather of nine. He says, "My wife and I are very family oriented, and the grandkids help me to focus on something other than golf 24 hours a day."

to reopen in November, 2025. Fought embraces the challenge posed by solving complex logistical and architectural scenarios.

Fought says, “To stay grounded, I always look at the design from a player’s perspective. This helps me to develop options. It’s mentally stimulating, and I love finding solutions to obstacles.”

He sums up his passion by saying, “If I didn’t love it, I wouldn’t do it.” ■ **Written by Alison Elsner**

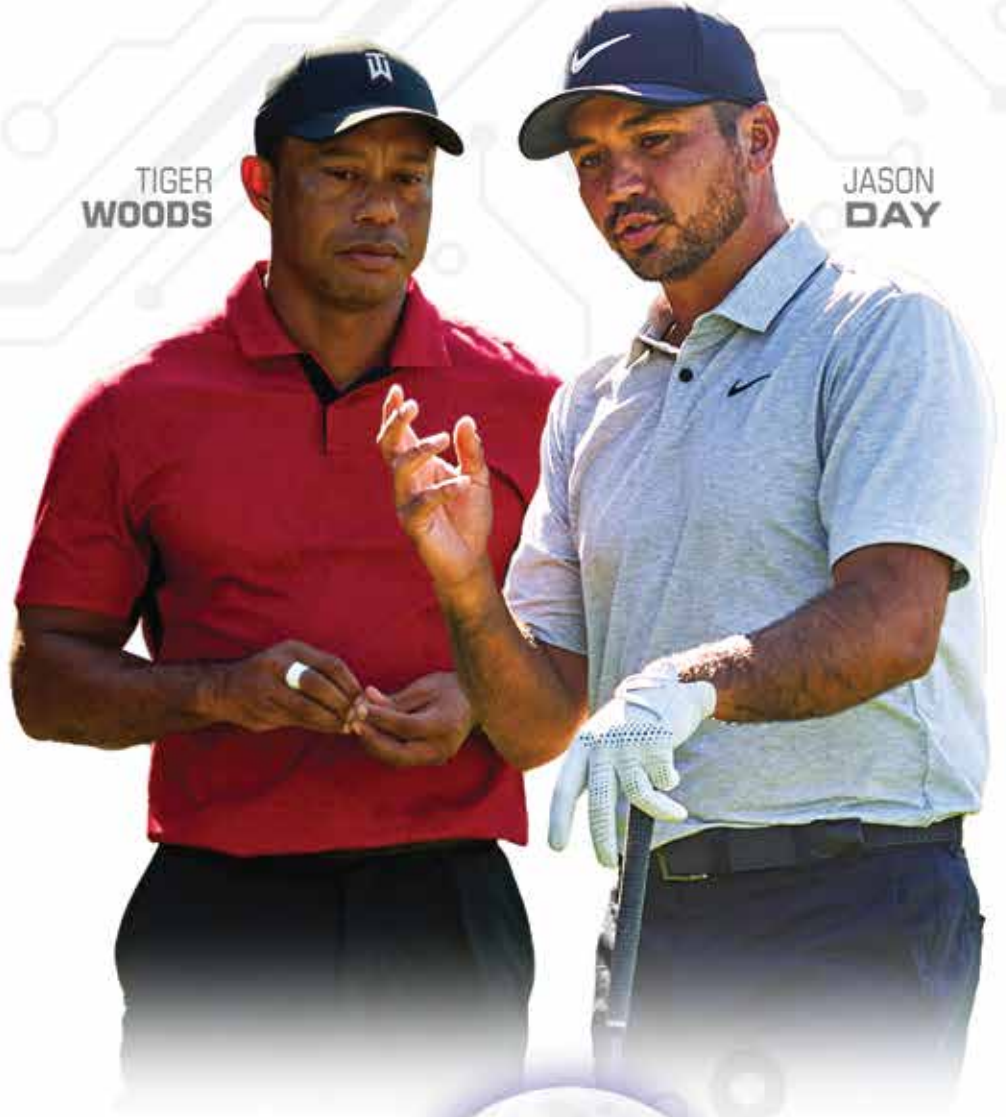

Swing Path

This months golf tip is feeling the 3 SWING PATHS. "Swing path"... By definition is the area at which the club, shaft & grip travel. See photo for the colored swim noodles representing the "SWING PATH OR FREEWAY" for where the golf club travels. I places some alignment rods in the ground, then swim noodles over them for a visual feel.



The 3 SWING PATHS ARE: on plane
(sequential to the shaft starting at address position)

"inside" = swinging to hit the noodles close to your body

"outside" = swinging to hit the far outside noodles
(some golfers call that over the top)

On SWING PATH "Golf Positions" to look or feel:

• **On plane / path : FOCUSING ON FEELS OF THE CLUB HEAD IS TRAVELING**

• If you are "on plane or swing path" you will feel: speed, power, lightness, distance great impact & solid contact

• **Inside:**

• If you are "inside or close to the inside noodles" you are inside
• You might feel : crowded, jamed, timing feels off, sequence feels off, club or shaft will feel "heavy",

• **Outside:**

• If you are "outside or close to the far noodles" you are outside
• You might feel : no power, arms only swing, lack of good contact, timing feels off, sequence feels off, club or shaft will feel "heavy" or disconnection"

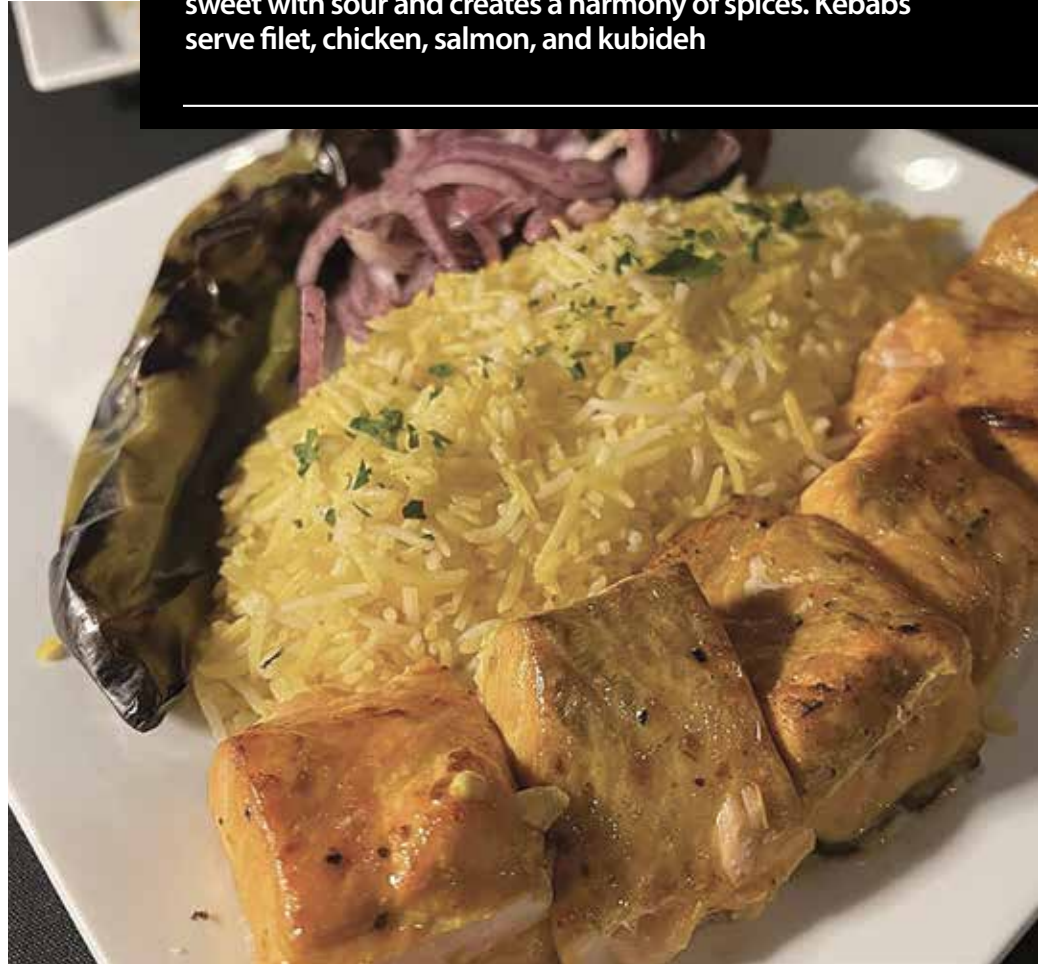

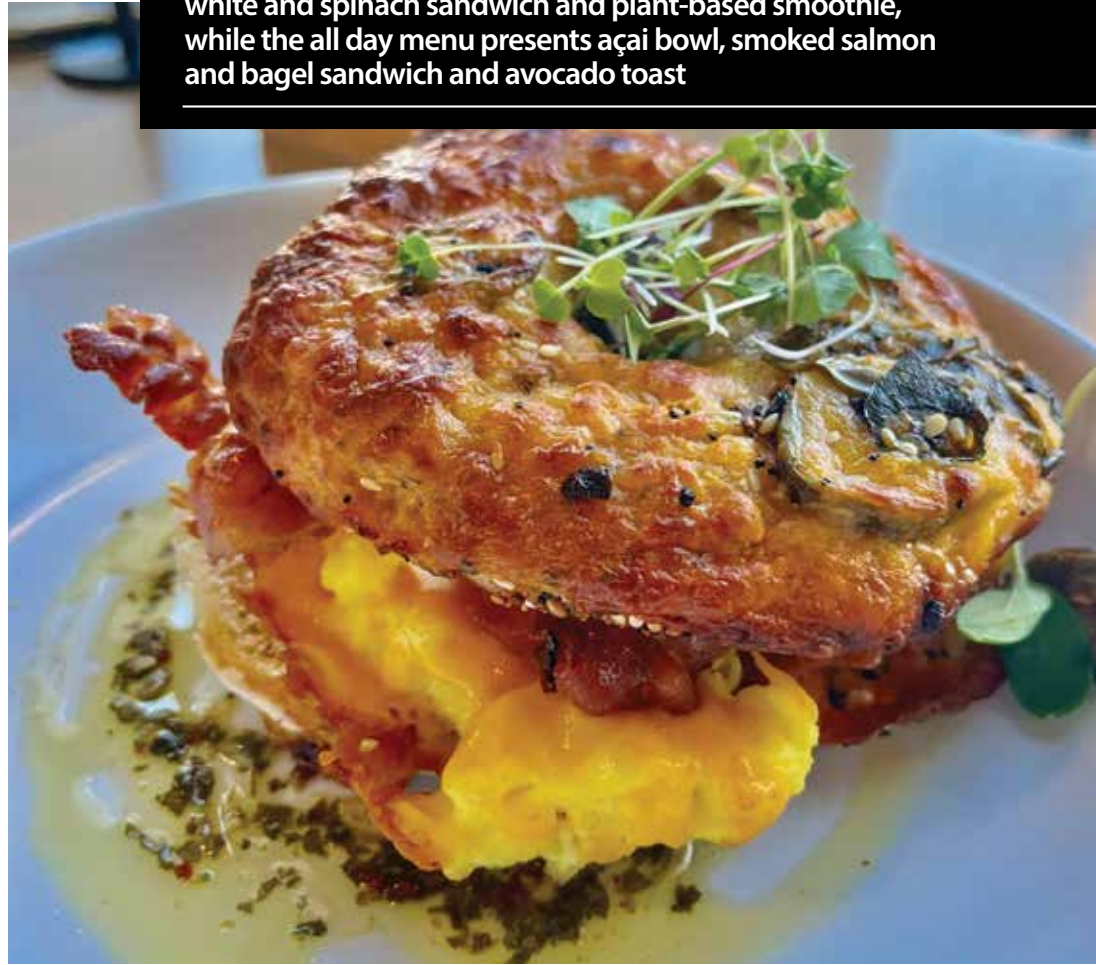

The one-of-a-kind **Flat Cut Boulder Opal Ring** was inspired by Gilson's vision of a luxuriant tropical pool. The center opal is surrounded by 125 hand-drilled, hand-posted natural pearls, a lush abundance one finds in the clear, blue-green waters of Bora Bora or Koh Samui. This ring was a multi-month labor of love for Gilson, who has brilliantly combined the primary blue green boulder opal (9.92 tcw.), natural black pearls (34.16 tcw.), steel blue and violet natural color diamonds (0.18 tcw.) and blued steel, all set in 18K yellow gold. \$94,000.

The **Rubelite Snake Earrings** feature bright, intense pink-red rubelites (14.35 tcw.), round orange Mandarin garnets (5.94 carats), and brown diamonds (0.32 tcw.). These sparkling earrings display the fiery magnetism of the serpent as the revered reptiles protectively wrap themselves around each gemstone, commanding respect for nature and seeing all with their piercing, diamond eyes. Menuki Necklace.

Japanese menuki, dated from 1760 to 1863 of the Edo Period, were used to decorate Samurai swords. Part of the Japanese Katana, the menuki are decorative metal ornaments woven under the tsuka-ito (handle wrapping) connecting to the blade. Gilson, after collecting these rare menuki with certificates over a period of time, used them to expertly craft the **Menuki Necklace**. He fabricated the bases in shakudo, the Japanese metal alloy of gold, silver, and copper and connected them to 22K gold decorative links resulting in a singular statement necklace. \$58,000.

Moonstone and Diamond Earrings

The **Moonstone and Diamond Earrings** show us how to live out loud with a symphony of subtle color, featuring white, hand carved natural jadeite rectangles inspired by a design reminiscent of both Art Deco and Lalique. The Moonstone (6.95 tcw.) and old European cut diamonds (1.25 tcw.) are set in blackened sterling, representing Gilson's power to instill a sublime sense of quiet regalia. \$34,000.
